ONTARIO HOUSING FIRST REGIONAL NETWORK COMMUNITY OF INTEREST (OHFRN-COI)

Housing First (HF) is an evidence-based program that has been shown to promote housing stability, quality of life, and community functioning for chronically homeless persons with mental illness and addictions in a large-scale, multi-site trial in Canada, At Home/Chez Soi, as well as several previous studies conducted in the U.S. (Aubry, Nelson, & Tsemberis, 2015).

The OHFRN-COI consists of Ontario HF policy-makers planners, managers, service-providers, researchers, and persons with lived experience, including representatives from the housing, health, and justice sectors. Key partners include the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness, the Homeless Hub, Service Canada and the Homelessness Partnering Strategy, and local HF programs.

- Expand HF programs across Ontario
- Promote high quality implementation of the HF model
- Obtain financial support for HF programs and research
- Inform provincial and local housing and support policies for homeless people with mental illness and addictions

The Long-Term Follow-Up of the Toronto At Home/Chez Soi programs - Dr. Vicky Stergiopoulos

The At Home/Chez Soi project was funded by the Mental Health Commission of Canada. The four-year demonstration project began in 2008 and took place in five cities – Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal and Moncton. The project evaluated the effectiveness of the "housing first" approach, where people are provided with a place to live and then receive recovery-oriented services and supports that best meet their individual needs. It confirmed that the evidence-based approach promotes housing stability, quality of life, and community functioning for chronically homeless persons with mental illness and addictions. The demonstration project also gathered information about how housing first works, who it works for, at what cost, and how it can be successfully implemented and adapted across Canada in diverse communities with different areas of focus.

During this presentation, Dr. Stergiopoulos will summarize the two year outcomes of the At Home/Chez Soi study, with a particular focus on the longer term Toronto site outcomes at six years post enrolment.

Peer Support Values in Action, Infrastructure & Implementation - Betty-Lou Kristy (RM 4100)

The Centre for Innovation in Peer Support was funded by the Mississauga Halton LHIN in 2015. The Centre supports over 60 peer support staff, over 25 peer supervisors, across 30 programs within their 11 partner agencies and hospitals regionally, and across the province. In order to do this work, the Centre has had to find ways to influence a philosophical shift to genuine person directed care in several spheres of influence. This workshop will share how they are supporting, validating, and influencing change for people engaging in services, staff teams, leaders, organizations and the healthcare system.

Parent-Child Relationship Outcomes for Indigenous Parents in the At Home/Chez Soi Housing First Demonstration Project - Rachel Caplan, Al Wiebe (RM T321)

This session underscores the importance of culturally-appropriate HF programs to support the healing journeys of Indigenous parents experiencing homelessness, mental illness, and separation from their children. Findings from a study that examined and compared the impacts of the At Home/Chez Soi HF intervention on parent-child relationship outcomes for Indigenous and non-Indigenous parents will be reported. Presenters will discuss how HF programs can positively impact parent-child relationships when delivered by Indigenous organizations, are guided by Indigenous worldviews, use culturally-relevant and culturally-safe practices, and are staffed by Indigenous service-providers and administrators.

Fidelity Exchange - Tim Aubry, Kathryn Gibb, Geoff Nelson (RM 2029)

HF program fidelity, or adherence to the principles and practices of the Pathways model, is important for ensuring positive outcomes for participants of HF programs. In this session, we review the domains and items of a measure of HF program fidelity. A new method of assessing program fidelity, known as "fidelity exchange" in which two HF programs assess the fidelity of each other, is described. A fidelity exchange is being piloted with Home for Good in Peel Region and Paths2Home in Waterloo Region. Program staff from these two programs are conducting external fidelity assessments on one another's programs. Anticipated benefits of this approach are shared.

Housing First with Case Management - Eric Agbata, Tim Aubry, Teresa Meulensteen, Maryann Roebuck (RM 2029)

The workshop will focus on the delivery of case management services in the context of HF. A review of the research on case management for people who are homeless will be presented followed by an introduction to strengths-based case management and how it has been integrated into a HF program.

Youth Homelessness - Lesley McMillian, Ashley Ward (RM 2022)

The Making the Shift (MtS) Demonstration Project aims to establish a strong evidence base for the Housing First for Youth (HF4Y) program model (Gaetz, 2017) and homelessness prevention models in Canada. The HF4Y model is a youth-centred adaptation of Housing First that aims to provide young people with safe, affordable, and developmentally appropriate access to housing and supports. As part of MtS, this model is being tested in three Ontario cities (Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton) with different populations of youth. This presentation will focus on two examples of HF4Y service delivery from the MtS project: Youth exiting care (Free 2 Be, WoodGreen Community Services, Toronto) and Indigenous youth exiting systems (Endaayaang, Hamilton Regional Indian Centre, Hamilton). A review of HF4Y fidelity assessment also will be provided.

Linking Housing First with ACT - Kelly Goz, Geoff Nelson, Robin Pow, Lin Sallay (RM 2029)

HF programs typically have Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) or some form of case management as the support component of the program. ACT programs are particularly important for participants with high needs, including serious mental illness. In this session, we will describe the origins of ACT, its connection with HF, and will provide one example of a HF program that uses ACT – the Cota ACT program in Toronto that has been a part of the At Home/Chez Soi research. We also describe the Ontario ACT Association and the implementation of ACT throughout Ontario. Problems linking ACT with HF in Ontario are noted, and strategies to overcome this gap will be discussed.

Screening and Assessment Tools for Housing First - John Ecker, Stephen Hwang (RM 2022)

This session will discuss screening and assessment tools that can be used in HF programs. The session will begin with a review of screening and assessment tools, followed by specific discussions on the Vulnerability Assessment Tool (VAT) and the Housing Support Assessment Tool (HSAT). Attendees will be encouraged to share their experiences with the screening and assessment process.

Logic Modelling and Outcome Evaluation in Housing First - Maritt Kirst (RM T321)

Session attendees will learn how to use a logic model to elaborate program theory of the intervention and guide outcome evaluation design. Attendees will also learn how to develop key evaluation questions, select appropriate evaluation methods and measures in the process of outcome evaluation design, with an eye for evaluating complex interventions.

Tim is a Full Professor in the School of Psychology and Senior Researcher at the Centre for Research on Educational and Community Services at the University of Ottawa. He is currently holder of the Faculty of Social Sciences Research Chair in Community Mental Health and Homelessness. Tim was a Member of the National Research Team and the Co-Lead of the Moncton site in At Home/Chez Soi Demonstration Project of the Mental Health Commission of Canada. More recently, he completed a an international study of program fidelity of Housing First programs in Europe and North America. Tim is the Co-Founder and Chair of the Ontario Housing First Regional Network – Community of Practice.

VICKY STERGIOPOULOS Clinician Scientist and the Physician-in-Chief, CAMH

Dr. Vicky Stergiopoulos is a Clinician Scientist and the Physician-in-Chief at CAMH. Prior to joining CAMH, she served as the Psychiatrist-in-Chief at St. Michael's Hospital, leading the development of a number of innovative health solutions for people experiencing homelessness and mental health and substance use challenges. Her program of research focuses on the design, implementation, evaluation and dissemination of interventions aiming to improve housing stability, service coordination and recovery of adults experiencing mental health and addiction challenges and social disadvantage.
