What are cannabis and alcohol?

- Both Cannabis and alcohol are legal drugs in Canada.
- Cannabis is used for many medical and nonmedical reasons.¹
- Cannabis can be consumed either by smoking or ingesting it.
- We know very little about the effect of cannabis on seniors because it is only recently legal.²
- Alcohol is a drug, and it can be harmful not only to the person using it but also to the people around them.³

What is problematic use?

Alcohol and cannabis use disorder involve compulsive use, loss of control over how much is consumed and continued use despite negative consequences.⁴

What are guidelines for using alcohol and cannabis?

- The only way to avoid all risk is to not use either drug⁵
- Set and stick to limits⁶
- Consider your age, weight and health⁶
